to lameness), the participants enjoyed the chance to try a relatively new AKC herding course, and we hope to expand to holding an all-breed ranch course next year.



When to Spay/Neuter Companion Dogs

Back in the stone age when I was a child, dog ownership was very different. Dogs were pretty much free to roam the neighborhood, professional grooming was maybe done on a poodle, no one clipped toenails, and brushing your dog's teeth would have earned you a psychiatric evaluation. Bitches might eventually be spayed, but only after a litter or two sired by whatever male won the fight in the back yard, and neutering males was pretty much unheard of in my dairy farming community where horses and cattle were routinely castrated. As the human population grew, dogs became more commonplace in urban and suburban areas. shelters began to struggle to keep up with ever-increasing numbers of homeless dogs and cats, and routine euthanasia of millions of healthy but homeless dogs and cats

became less and less socially acceptable. One of the principal tools used to reduce the population of homeless dogs and cats was an aggressive campaign to encourage spaying/neutering (S/N) of pets, and by the early 2000's roughly 2/3 of dogs in the US were S/N, and shelters and rescue organizations required S/N before releasing an animal for adoption, even when that meant puppies as young as 2 months old were S/N before adoption.

the prevalence of increased, research on the effect of S/N on a variety of medical conditions in dogs began emerge. What can I say – nerds are always on the lookout for a new topic to investigate, and this is a topic that has practical implications for a lot of dog owners. Overall, the results of these studies were somewhat to very alarming. Hip dysplasia, cranial cruciate ligament injuries, lymphoma, mast cell hemangiosarcoma, tumors, urinary and osteosarcoma incontinence were all found to be

more prevalent in S/N dogs than their intact counterparts. While no one wants to go back to the days of crammed animal shelters freezers full of animals euthanized because they vastly outnumbered the homes available to them, increasing the risk of orthopedic issues and premature death of our canine companions isn't great either. As sort of a compromise, many breeders and veterinarians continue to encourage S/N but recommended that pets reach full maturity before being sterilized. The problem is that information on how much the age at which a dog is S/N actually affects the increased risk of cancer or orthopedic problems is pretty thin. And some of the risk may be breed specific. For example, the concern about the effect of S/N on osteosarcoma is based largely on a study done on Rottweilers, a breed with exceptionally high incidence of osteosarcoma. It's highly debatable whether one should be concerned about S/N increasing the risk of osteosarcoma in a breed where that particular cancer is rare.

A team of researchers at the Vet school at UC Davis has been working to address the issue of whether age of S/N and the breed of dog influence the risk that appears to be associated with S/N. initial studies on golden retrievers, S/N increased the risk of obesity regardless of how old the dog was when sterilized, but S/N only increased the risk orthopedic issues in dogs sterilized before they were 6 months old and goldens that were S/N after a year of age actually had somewhat lower rates of orthopedic problems than intact goldens. Similar studies by this same group for German Shepherd Dogs and Labrador Retrievers makes the question of the effect of breed and age on of S/N on various health issues murkier and murkier. Without going into all the details, the overall answer to whether S/N is a health risk or not, and whether age at S/N affects that health risk is a clear and definitive, "uhm, well, it depends".

This same team of researchers has expanded their research now to include 35 breeds of dog, comparing the incidence of hip and elbow dysplasia, cranial cruciate ligament injuries, lymphoma, hemangiosarcoma, mast tumors, and osteosarcoma in intact dogs and dogs S/N at less than 6 months old, between 6 months and a year old, between 1 and 2 years old, and over 2 years old. examined (well. they had computers, and probably an army of work/study students examine) the computerized records of over 15,000 dogs, categorized by breed, intact vs S/N, and age of S/N, and then compared the incidence of each medical condition in each category. If you want to seek out all the nitty gritty details for a particular breed, you can go to the link at the end of this write-up, and dig in. But this is a newsletter for a collie club, so I'll report the details for our breed. Although the authors (and their army of students) looked at the records of a lot of dogs, unfortunately for us, only 116 collie records were available for the study -29 intact males, 26

neutered males, 24 intact females, and 37 spayed females. None of the 26 neutered males developed hip elbow dysplasia or experienced cranial cruciate ligament injuries, and of 29 intact males, one had developed hip dysplasia and one had developed elbow dysplasia. Of the 61 female collies, the only joint problem was one who was spayed between six months and a year and experienced a cranial cruciate ligament injury. So, with only roughly 25 to 35 collies in each category, it's pretty tough to say whether S/N had any effect on common orthopedic problems, but it's nice to know that those problems seem pretty rare in collies overall. For the four types of cancer studied, five of the 55 males developed one of those cancers during the course of the study – one male neutered at less than six months, one male neutered after two years of age, and three intact males. Of the 61 female collies, only three developed one of the four cancers studied, two that were spayed before six months, and one that was spayed after two years. So, for collies I would say

first that we need a bigger sample size (the lament of every researcher), but based on the limited evidence available, there's no compelling reason to avoid or delay S/N surgery.

One of the limitations of this study, besides the small sample size for many breeds, is that it depended on contained in a set of data computerized veterinary records associated with one Veterinary Hospital. For many of the dogs, those records did not necessarily continue for the entire life of the dog, for a variety of reasons. But many cases of health issues may been overlooked have simply because the health problems may not have been recorded in that particular hospital's set of records because the owner may have moved away, or switched vets, or placed the dog in a different home. But recognizing that this study, like all research, has its limitations, I think it does clearly show that recommendations on S/N should be tailored to breed. For many of the 35 breeds studied, there simply

weren't enough records for that individual breed to make sound recommendations. But in general, the detrimental effect of S/N on orthopedic problems was mainly confined to a few of the larger breeds, and increased risk of cancer following S/N was limited to a few breeds. For most breeds, S/N had no detectable effect on the medical conditions studied.

Margaret Joan Meagher

SumerHill Collies

Joan was the first of four children to Malcolm and Betty Sharp, and the only daughter. She married Michael S. Meagher in 1963 and were together just short of 60 years. She graduated high school from Holy Names Academy, and graduated with a BA and most of a Masters from Gonzaga University.

She was a woman with an unquenchable desire to learn about... everything. She read voraciously from tomes of art history, birds and flowers to fantasy and science fiction. She had both hidden and obvious talents. She was a professional ballerina who learned the shimmy from Blaze Starr for a Denver dance production. That early

ballet training lent itself to her always graceful movements. She had an exquisite eye for art and jewelry but could frame a postcard as readily as buy an original painting. She worked at Shell Oil in the 60's but signed up for an archelogy expedition in South America, intent on learning Spanish.

She loved folk music, and her house was filled with the sounds of Glen Yarborough, the Kingston Trio, and the Chad Mitchell Trio, later morphing into Meatloaf, Tina Turner, Broadway albums and other artists. Quiet and unassuming Joan was, nonetheless, an adventuresome soul; she loved skiing enough that she and Michael went skiing for their honeymoon. She was a veterinarian office billing clerk and their secret puppy mid-wife. A great wife and mom, Joan supported her children, believing in them, and ensuring they were exposed to both extra-curricular sports and art classes. Smart and insightful, she had a wonderful sense of humor that showed up unexpectedly and the warmest greeting for special people ("Hello, Princess") and eyes that sparkled with intelligence and genuine amusement. Joan also raised the sweetest, championship collies.

Joan joined the Inland Empire Collie Club in the early 70's and that is where I met her, as we became members around the same time. She was a member of the Collie Club of America for 49 years. During her years of SumerHill Collies (yes, just one "m" she would always say), she shared many memories with me, and I wish I had paid closer attention. She lived in town on a small, oversized lot by Cliff Park. She would always tell me about that one litter of 12 pups — ALL SMOOTHS! Joan's love was smooths but, in those days, there were not many people who knew about smooths. She bred to Black Hawk of Kasan, among those puppies was CH SumerHIll The Winds of

Chance – (Whisper). In the Hawkins Ratings, she was #7 Smooth Bitch for 1979. There were 2 more of her collies that made the top 10: 1983 - #3 CH SumerHill Inherit The Wind (Runner) and 1985 - #7 CH Sumerhill Special Delivery (Pilot). She had many other champions also. Her dogs were very special to her, and she was very careful about them finding the right homes. She was humble about her achievements but also very proud since she did not do a lot of breeding.

Joan was very willing to come out and sit with a new litter of pups as I went to work. On the very first one, I thought that the dam was done, and Joan delivered a much later puppy she had to work to get him to breathe and survive. That puppy was Banjo, and he was my son's lifelong companion. From then on, Joan and I formed a very close friendship. We traveled together to many dog events. She told me so many stories of her trips, several to the National. We had discussions about many dogs and breeding as she had seen, in person, many of the dogs I hadn't. She would gladly talk about those dogs (well any collie), their attributes and faults. Breedings were discussed and possibilities mulled over. As health testing became available, we discussed all the possibilities. In 2014, I had a litter born from GCH King's Valley Smooth Blue Jazz HT CGC (Fergus) x Sinkona's Shadow Dancer (Tango). Joan came out every week and sat with puppies, easily for an hour or more, just snuggling and watching them. At one point she told me that she would like to have one of the pups. I fretted and fretted about that pup as she went through some horrible growing stages, and I told Joan "I don't know if we will be able to show her". Well, Joan was patient, and we took that puppy out to shows. That puppy became GCHB Sinkona's SumerHill Dancer PT (Sedona)! She would bring her out for herding practice, and we

traveled to the CCA Western Herding Regional together, Joan loving every minute of watching Sedona "shine" in the ring! I am so glad that she had that final girl that accomplished those special things for her. During the years I knew Joan, she was one of the most kind, respectful, and helpful person to anyone that she met. There is so much that can be said about her and many wonderful memories.

Joan will be missed sitting by the ring watching the collies, marking those catalogs, and talking with whomever wanted to talk about collies. She is with her SumerHill (with one "m") collies enjoying watching us.

In addition to her husband, she is survived by her three children Shannon Meagher, Sean Meagher, and Colin Meagher; daughters-in-law Lorie Arnold, Pamela Shaw, and Nikki Rohan; two grandchildren, Sadie Roraback-Meagher and Madoc Meagher; step-grandchildren Hazel and Hudson Hollatz, and brother Donald Sharp SJ, as well as numerous nieces and nephews.
